

## **BODY OF NEGRO WOMAN FOUND IN THE WOODS**

The body of an unidentified negro woman apparently about 35 years old, was found in a ditch in the woods near the Southern railway tracks about a mile from Hapeville, by R. P. Wood, a farmer living at Mountain View. The gruesome discovery was made about 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

The woman's skull had been fractured near the base and her throat cut. She had been dead several hours. Mr. Wood notified the county police, stating to them that he was walking to Hapeville from his home when he discovered the body a few feet from the path in the woods.

The coroner was notified and the body was taken to the undertaking establishment of H. H. & T. E. Williams, 185 Auburn avenue, where an inquest will be held this afternoon.
